Crowea exalata Ginninderra Falls. A local plant that is flowering particularly well at present.



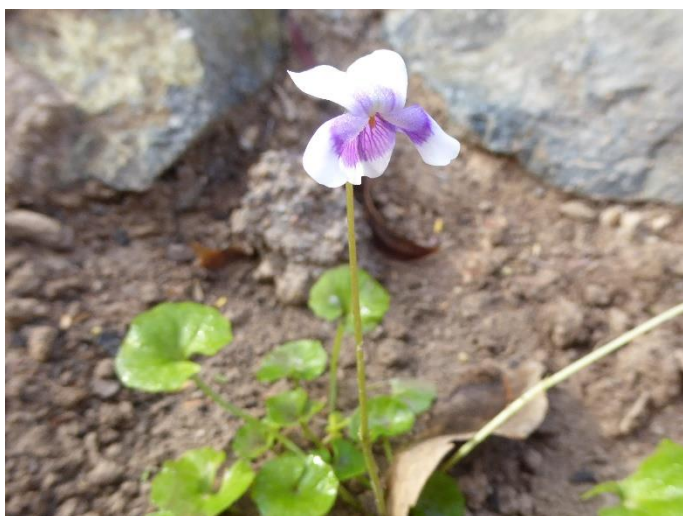
Xerochrysum viscosum, Sticky Everlasting. A hardy local perennial daisy. Will regrow from the base.



Brachyscome graminea, Grass Daisy. A hardy summer and autumn flowering perennial daisy.



Calotis glandulosa, Mauve Burr-daisy. A perennial daisy with spiny seed capsules. Endangered in NSW.



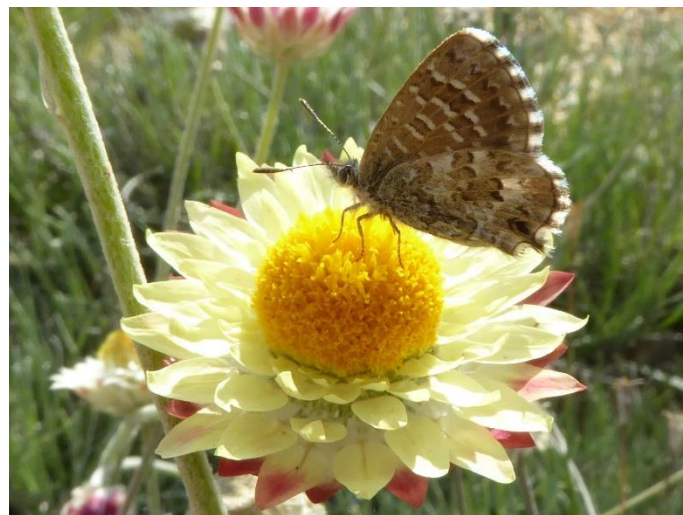
Viola hederacea, Ivy-leaved Violet. A dense and spreading stoloniferous herb. Appreciates moisture.



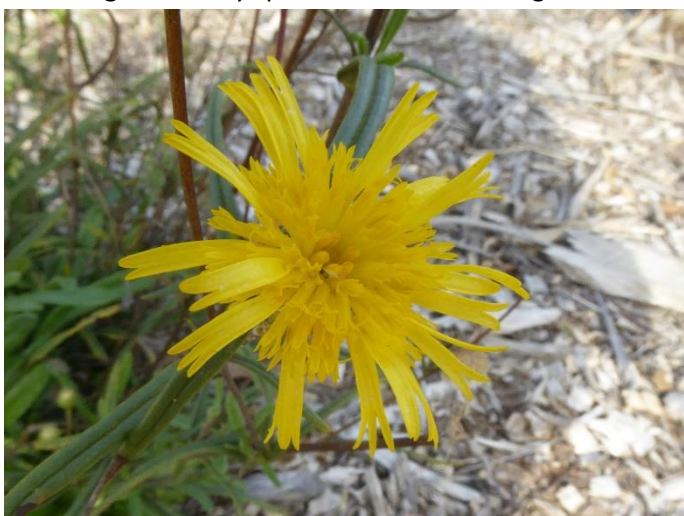
Pelargonium australe, Native Pelargonium. A long flowering member of the *Geraniaceae* family.



Leucochrysum albicans, Hoary Sunray. A long flowering local daisy species. Grows well on gravel.



Theclinesthes serpentata, Saltbush Blue (butterfly) on *Leucochrysum albicans*. Wings when open are blue.



Podolepis jaceoides, Showy Copper-wire Daisy. An excellent long flowering perennial daisy.

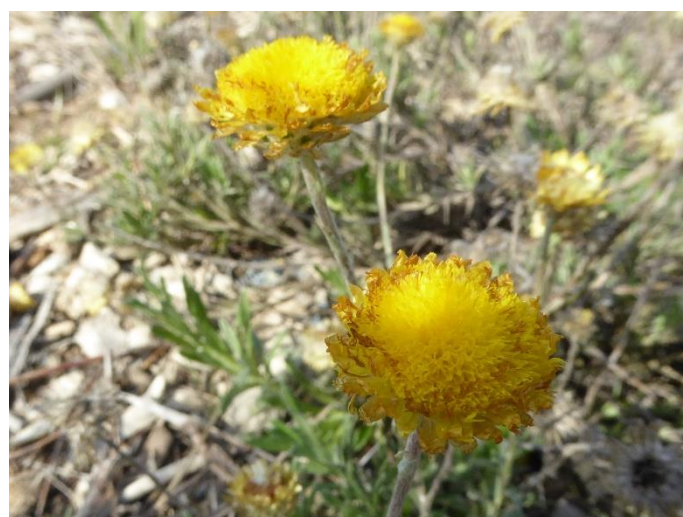


Acacia penninervis, Mountain Hickory Wattle. This wattle is found in many locations across the ACT.



Brachyscome dentata, Lobe-seed Daisy. A perennial daisy found over most of NSW.
