Of Interest at Forest 20, September 2022 Number 88 Wattle Week



Acacia buxifolia box-leaf Wattle. An open shrub or small tree to 3m. Generally a hardy desirable species.



Acacia melanoxylon, Blackwood. Well known for its dark durable timber. Widespread from SA Tas to Qld.



Acacia rubida Red-stemmed Wattle. Shown last month but now in full bloom.





Acacia pycnantha Golden Wattle. Australia's national floral emblem. Considered a tall shrub up to 8m tall.



Acacia decurrens Early Black Wattle. A medium tree with dense dark green bipinnate leaves.



Acacia siculiformis Dagger Wattle. The sharp tipped phyllodes are considered to resemble a dagger.



Acacia boormanii Snowy River Wattle. A medium sized shrub that is known to sucker.



Acacia gunnii Ploughshare Wattle. A low growing wattle with short, sharp phyllodes.



Acacia cultriformis knife-leaf Wattle. A widely cultivated large shrub that is yet to fully bloom.

Acacia dealbata Silver Wattle. One of the most common wattles in our local bushland. May sucker.



Acacia ulicifolia Juniper Wattle. A particularly spikey dense medium sized shrub.



Acacia pravissima Ovens Wattle. A tall shrub with a pendulous branches with triangular phyllodes.
