Pelargonium Sp. Striatellum, Omeo Stork's-bill. A yet to be described species laden with the morning dew.



Daviesia mimosoides, Narrow-leaved Bitter-pea. An out of season group of flowers of this spring flowerer.



Rytidosperma bipartitum, Leafy Wallaby Grass. Some late seed heads of this densely growing species.



Banksia marginata, Silver Banksia. A tree to 12 metres or down to a shrub depending where it is growing.



Callistemon subulatus, Dwarf Bottlebrush. A compact and pendulous shrub showing a late set of flowers.



Xerochrysum viscosum, Sticky Everlasting. A hardy local everlasting daisy. Cut back in late winter.



We are building a low rock wall to protect a path edge near the new entrance.



Macrolepiota dolichaula, White Parasols. The gills are white to cream on maturity, free from the stem.



Dichondra repens, Kidney weed. A ground cover that has appreciated the recent degree of moisture.

Calotis glandulosa, Mauve Burr-daisy. A perennial burr-daisy with spiny seed capsules.



Solanum linearifolium, Mountain Kangaroo Apple. A tall woody shrub that reseeds readily.



Viola hederacea, Ivy-leaved Violet. A stoloniferous perennial ground cover that appreciates the wet times
