Swainsona galegifolia Smooth Darling-pea. This attractive pea can grow to over a metre tall.



Pelargonium rodneyanum Magenta Storksbill. This attractive herb flowers for an extended period.



Xanthorrhoea glauca Southern Grass Tree. Growing in the Bush Tucker Garden with great vigour.



Eryngium ovinum Blue Devil. A perennial herb that will renew from the base in spring.



Solanum linearifolium Mountain Kangaroo Apple. A tall woody shrub that readily reseeds.



Chrysocephalum semipapposum Tall Everlasting. A perennial daisy. Cut back old growth in spring when its new growth emerges.



Ajuga australis Austral Bugle. A perennial herb that is well known on Canberra slopes and hillsides.



Calotis glandulosa Mauve Burr-daisy. A perennial burr-daisy with spiny seed capsules.



Calocephalus citreus Lemon Beauty Heads. A low perennial herb of the daisy family with silvery foliage.

Bursaria spinosa Blackthorn. A small tree or shrub. An understory species of eucalypt woodland.



Goodenia pinnatifida Cut-leaf Goodenia. A widespread species in the ACT according to Canberra Nature Map.



Dianella tasmanica Tasman Flax-lily. Though first collected in Tasmania, this species is found in moist shaded forests of eastern Australia, NSW Vic & Tas.
