Of Interest at Forest 20, July 2019



Crowea exalata Ginninderra Falls, Small Crowea. A long flowering local plant. A darker colour than usual.



Hardenbergia violacea, False Sarsaparilla. A wellknown woodland species of the ACT. First flowering.



Coronidium gunnianum, Pale Everlasting. A hardy everlasting daisy. Previously *Helichrysum rutidolepis.*



Grevillea diminuta, Brindabella Grevillia. A small shrub that tends to hide its flowers. A late afternoon photo.



Westringia eremicola, Slender Westringia with parrot feather. A low to medium shrub with leaves in whorls.



Calotis glandulosa, Mauve Burr-daisy. A perennial daisy with spiny seeds. Endangered in NSW.



Eucalyptus blakelyi, Blakely's Red Gum. Tree planted by the former ACT Chief Minister Jon Stanhope.



Microseris walteri, Murgon. A perennial herb used by indigenous communities as a food source.



Xerochrysum viscosum, Sticky Everlasting. A hardy perennial local daisy. Cut back old growth in spring.

Grevillea iaspicula, Wee Jasper Grevillea. A tall shrub that is endangered in its natural setting.



Leucochrysum albicans, Hoary Sunray. A long flowering local daisy. Grows well in a gravel mulch.



Pomaderris pallida, Pale Pomaderris in bud. Listed as vulnerable in ACT and NSW May 2019.
