Acacia gunnii Ploughshare Wattle. A low growing wattle in the Acacia Walk.



Acacia rubida Red-stemmed Wattle. Another species in the Acacia Walk that is just starting to flower.



Podolepis jaceoides Showy Copper-wire Daisy. Receiving some shelter from the nearby shed.



Eucalyptus macrorhyncha Red Stringybark. Colourful new growth on a young tree.



Westringia eremicola Slender Westringia. A particularly long flowering shrub.

Goodenia ovata Hop Goodenia. A rounded shrub that responds well to pruning.
