Acacia penninervis, Mountain Hickory. This is flowering earlier than usual.



Brachychiton populneus, Kurrajong. A medium sized tree that has bell shaped flowers occurring from October to December.



Calotis lappulacea, Yellow Burr-daisy. A long flowering dwarf perennial with prickly seed heads.



Eucalyptus polyanthemos, Red Box. An attractive local eucalypt.



Allocasuarina verticilatta, Drooping She-oak. A tree with pendulous foliage found in the south-east of Australia.



Leucochrysum albicans, Hoary Sunray. A long flowering perennial daisy.
