Eucalyptus macrorhyncha, Red Stringybark
A eucalypt of dry sclerophyll forest



Eucalyptus rubida, Candlebark. An open
woodland tree.



Brachychiton populneus, Kurrajong. A medium
sized tree that has bell shaped flowers
occurring from October to December.

Blossom of *Eucalyptus macrorhyncha*
Has been a magnet for insects this autumn



Acacia penninervis, Mountain Hickory. This is
flowering earlier than usual.



Calotis lappulacea, Yellow Burr-daisy.
A long flowering dwarf perennial with prickly
seed heads.



Eucalyptus polyanthemos, Red Box. An attractive local eucalypt.



Eucalyptus polyanthemos, well budded up for a good showing perhaps in the coming spring.



Allocasuarina verticillata, Drooping She-oak. A tree with pendulous foliage found in the south-east of Australia.



Acacia cultriformis, Knife-leaf Wattle. A shrub with blueish foliage that will flower in spring.



Leucochrysum albicans, Hoary Sunray. A long flowering perennial daisy.



Crowea exalata Ginninderra Falls, Small Crowea. A long flowering local plant.
