Of Interest at Forest 20, November 2017


Bulbine glauca, Rock Lily. A tufted herb that has a lengthy flowering period.


Solanum linearifolium, Mountain Kangaroo Apple. A long flowering tall woody shrub that regenerates easily.


Calotis glandulosa, Mauve burr-daisy A perennial daisy with spiny seed heads. Endangered in the wild.


Calotis lappulacea, Yellow Burr-daisy. A long flowering low perennial herb with spiny seed heads.


Dodonaea viscosa subsp. angustifolia. Sticky Hopbush. A shrub to small tree with attractive seeds capsules.


Ranunculus papulentus, Large River Buttercup. An attractive perennial herb having underground stolons.


Eucalyptus dives, Broad-leaved Peppermint. A grey fibrous barked eucalypt with broad grey-green leaves.


Microseris lanceolata, Murnong or Yam Daisy. Perennial herb which was a food source for the indigenous people.


Veronica perfoliata, Digger's Speedwell. A dwarf to small perennial shrub to a metre high with prolific flowers.

Calytrix tetragona, Common Fringe Myrtle. A low to medium local shrub with white to pink flowers.


Westringia eremicola, Slender Westringia. A perennial shrub growing to a metre high with attractive flowers.


Linum marginale, Native Flax. A short lived perennial herb to .6 m high that readily self-seeds.
