Hakea microcarpa, Small-fruited Hakea. A shrub with sharp pointed leaves. Good cover for small birds.



Leucochrysum albicans, Hoary Sunray. A long flowering local daisy.



Pultenaea procumbens, Heathy Bush-pea. A spreading or rarely erect shrub.

Grevillea iaspicula, Wee Jasper Grevillea. A tall shrub that is endangered in its natural situation.



Linum marginale, Native Flax. A short-lived perennial herb that is often overlooked when not in flower.



Bulbine glauca, Rock Lily with *Apis mellifera* European Honey Bee. A tufted herb that flowers for a long period.



Dianella revoluta, Blue Flax-lily. A tough clumping perennial species that will grow in sun or shade.



Westringia eremicola, Slender Westringia. A free flowering small shrub found from Queensland to SA.



Kunzea parvifolia, Violet Kunzea. A hardy small shrub that is drought and frost tolerant.

Podolepis jaceoides, Showy Copper-wire Daisy. An excellent long flowering daisy.



Microseris lanceolata, Murnong. A perennial herb used as a food source by indigenous communities.



Dillwynia sericea, Showy Parrot-Pea. An upright or spreading shrub producing flowers in clusters.
