Eucalyptus polyanthemos, Red Box is a medium sized tree with dense foliage. Several are flowering now.



Acacia cultriformis, Knife-leaf Wattle. This is one of many Wattles that are flowering at present.



Bulbine glauca, Rock Lily. A tufted perennial herb that flowers for a long time.





Grevillea iaspicula Wee Jasper Grevillea. A tall shrub that is endangered in its natural setting.



Brachyscome spathulata, Spoon-leaved Daisy. A perennial daisy that is looking particularly good.



Daviesia mimosoides, Narrow-leaf Bitter Pea. A woody perennial shrub.



Indigofera australis, Austral Indigo. An open woody shrub of medium height. Responds well to pruning.



Pomaderris betulina subsp. actensis, Pomaderris. A woodland shrub of the Southern Tablelands



Gynatrix pulchella Hemp Bush. A shrub that has separate male and female flowers.

Olearia microphylla, Small-leaf Daisy bush. A dark green leaved compact low daisy bush.

Leucochrysum albicans, Hoary Sunray. A long flowering perennial daisy planted in several positions.
