Pomaderris intermedia, Golden Pomaderris. A large shrub or small tree with profuse light-yellow flowers.



Acacia melanoxylon, Blackwood Wattle or simply Blackwood. A tree of higher rainfall areas Qld to SA



Calotis glandulosa, Mauve Burr-daisy. A perennial burr-daisy with spiny seeds. A vulnerable species in NSW

Vanessa kershawi, Australian Painted Lady on Leucochrysum albicans, Hoary Sunray.



Indigofera australis, Austral Indigo. An open medium woody shrub which responds well to pruning.



Acacia acinacea, Gold-dust Wattle. A most attractive small to medium sized shrub. Drought and frost tolerant.



Clematis microphylla, Small-leaved Clematis. A frost hardy climber that suits a sunny well drained position.



Acacia paradoxa, Kangaroo Thorn. A wattle that is a frost hardy spreading prickly shrub.



Grevillea alpina, Mountain Grevillea. A variable species that is cold tolerant. This is a prostrate form.

Acacia buxifolia, Box-leaf Wattle. A medium sized shrub that is commonly found in ACT reserves.



Goodia lotifolia, Golden Tip or Clover Bush. A dense medium sized pea-flowering shrub.



Brachyscome spathulata, Spoon-leaf Daisy. An attractive perennial daisy.
